AUSTRIA

G57 (ICB1958):

Respondents born in 1959 was coded as 2 and therefore not asked question G58 (PLNCHLD).

C12 (RLGDNME):

Translation changed since ESS round 1 to harmonise the question with German and Swiss translations.

DENMARK

6 cases

(idno=17982/23119/25640/26858/27074/31649) have more than 50% Refusal, Don't know or No answer in Main questionnaire.

ESTONIA

1 case (idno=1216) has more than 50% Refusal, Don't know or No answer in Main questionnaire.

FINLAND

C9 (RLGBLG), C10 (RLGDNM), C11 (RLGBLGE), C12 (RLGDNME):

Question C9 (RLGBLG) was specified changed after two weeks of fieldwork by adding for those who answered "No" a prompt "Do you belong to the church?". This is contrary to the guideline given in the source questionnaire. This deviation also influences the rest of the religious denomination section. The Finnish data have been omitted from the integrated file, but the deposited variables are available from a separate country specific file for Finland.

F46 (WKDCORP):

This question was not included in the Finnish questionnaire before 13 Oct. 2004 and has therefore a very high proportion of the missing value 99 "No answer".

GREECE

F38 (CRPDWKP):

Filter error, all respondents with partner was asked this question.

NORWAY

1 case (idno=2092) have more than 50% Refusal, Don't know or No answer in Main questionnaire.

G120-G124 (ICCHLD-PTHCNCR):

Filter error, questions asked to both men and women.

F6 (EDLVNO/EDULVL):

Distribution differ from ESS2002. Information about respondents educational level was in 2002 collected from public register, while from separate question in ESS2004.

SLOVENIA

One case (idno 128) has more than 50% Refusal, Don't know or No answer in Main questionnaire.

C16 (DSCRGRP):

Coding error, all respondents with code 2 in C16 (DSCRGRP) have got code 1 in C17 (DSCRREF).

SPAIN

G117 (FSTJBYR):

Incorrect use of filter. Code 0000 was not included in the CAPI programme. All such respondents were assigned the value 8888, resulting in an incorrect use of filter in G118 (YRSPDWK) and G121-G124 (FLTHMCC-PTHCNCR).

SWEDEN

Two cases (idno 2013209 and 3029949) have more than 50% Refusal, Don't know or No answer in Main questionnaire.

G18 (CRPDWKP):

Incorrect use of filter. All 17 respondents with category 1 in G18 (CRPDWKP) were not asked question G19 to G21

SWITZERLAND

C23 (LNGHOMA/LNGHOMB):

Swiss/Swiss German language is coded "GER" in 2004, while "GEM" was used in ESS2002.

F6 (EDLVACH):

Education variable has nominal scale, not ordinal.

C10 (RLGDNM):

Distribution differ from ESS2002 with higher percentage of protestants (RLGDNM=2) in round 2, due to error in 2002 variable.

UNITED KINGDOM

2 cases (idno=21814/25402) have more than 50% Refusal, Don't know or No answer in Main questionnaire.

F6 (EDULVL EDLVALGB):

Data for EDULVL has been omitted from the integrated file, but is available as EDULVLGB in a country specific file for the United Kingdom. Educational variable EDLVAGB has also been moved from the integrated data file to a country specific file. The removals are caused

by insufficient questions to allow correct bridging to the ESS variable EDULVL.

G121-G124 (FLTHMCC-PTHCNCR):

Filter error between FSTJBYR/ICGNDR/ICCHLD and G121-G124. G121-G124 were asked to females with son/daughter regardless of earlier job experience, including those with FSTJBYR=0 (Never had such a job). G121-G124 also not asked to all females with son/daughter.

iii) Deviations from the “Specifications for participating countries”¹

All participating countries had to adhere to a detailed specification about all aspects of conducting the survey, in order to take part in the ESS. In reality, however, some countries were not able to follow all parts of the specification exactly. This section details **all** known deviations from the specification, however minor. Not all of these will affect the reliability of data comparisons, but for the sake of transparency they are all recorded.

The section is grouped into the following main topics: set-up and contractual issues; sample size and design; response and non-response; questionnaire; contact forms dataset; fieldwork; interviewers; event and contextual data. Under each heading, the main requirements are given as laid out in the specification, followed by any deviations.

1. *Set-up and contractual issues*

- a) *Requirement: “Each national funding agency is to appoint (or cause to be appointed) a National Coordinator and a Survey Organisation”(2.1).*

- b) *Requirement: "The first contact with potential respondents, following a possible advance letter, will be face-to-face. ... The one exception to this is where the country's sample is one of named individuals with telephone numbers" (5.12).*

There was no country, where the call schedule envisaged first contacts by telephone, when no sample of named individuals was used.

- c) *Requirement: " Various specific steps designed to enhance response rates should also be allowed for. They include **at least four personal visits** by interviewers to each sampling unit before it is abandoned as non-productive, including at least one visit in the evening and at least one at the weekend" (5.6).⁸*

d) *Requirement: All interviews had to be conducted face-to-face.*

All countries complied with this requirement.

e) *Requirement: "The supplementary questionnaire may be administered in **either one** of the following ways: 1) as an extension of the main interview questionnaire or 2) as a self-completion questionnaire. A combination of the two methods above may NOT be used" (5.9).*

Analysis of the ESS 2004 dataset (Edition 2.0, variable SPLTADMA) revealed that in **France** approximately half of the sample was interviewed face-to-face, the other half filled in a self-completion questionnaire.

7. Interviewers

a) *Requirement: "All interviewers will be personally briefed by the National Co-ordinator or members of the research team from the survey organisation before carrying out an assignment, drawing on detailed interviewer instructions prepared by the CCT"(5.12).*
